PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT POLICY

Policy Involvement

In order to support the mission of Pride Academy Charter School and comply with NCLB guidelines for Title I funding, the Board, administration, and faculty of Pride Academy Charter School commit to:

- 1. Convene an annual meeting, at a convenient time, to which all parents of participating pupils are invited and encouraged to attend. The purpose of this meeting is to inform parents of our school's participation in NCLB funding, the requirements of this Policy, and the right of parents to be involved.
- 2. Offer a flexible number of meetings at various times, such as in the morning or evening, and if necessary, provide, with Title I funds, transportation, childcare, or home visits in order to facilitate parent involvement.
- 3. Involve parents, in an organized, ongoing, and timely way, in the design, review, and improvement of programs, including the design, review, and improvement of the school parental involvement policy and the joint development of the school-wide NCLB program plan.
- 4. Provide parents of participating pupils with the following:
 - timely information about programs required by NCLB, §1118;
 - a description and explanation of the curriculum in use at the school, the forms of academic assessment used to measure student progress, and the proficiency levels students are expected to meet;

- 5. Submit any parent comments on the NCLB plan when the school makes the plan available to the Board of Education, if the school-wide program plan under §1114(b)(2) of NCLB is not satisfactory to the parents of participating pupils.

Shared Responsibilities For High Student Academic Achievement

Each school served by Title I funds shall jointly develop with parents of all pupils served with Title I funds, a school-parent compact that outlines how parents, the entire school staff, and students will share the responsibility for improved student academic achievement and the means by which the school and parents will build and develop a partnership to help children achieve the State's high standards.

The compact will:

- 1. Building Capacity For Involvement

To ensure effective involvement of parents and to support a partnership among the school, parents, and the community to improve student academic achievement, Pride Academy Charter School:

- 1. Shall provide assistance to parents in understanding such topics as the State's academic content standards and student academic achievement standards, State and local academic assessments, the requirements of this Policy, and how to monitor progress and work with educators to improve the achievement of their children.
- 2. Shall provide materials and training to help parents work with their children to improve achievement, such as literacy training and the use of technology.
- 3. Shall educate administrators, faculty, and staff with the assistance of parents, in the value and utility of contributions of parents, and in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents as equal partners, implement and coordinate parent programs, and build strong home-school partnerships.
- 4. Shall, to the extent feasible and appropriate, coordinate and integrate parent involvement programs and activities with programs like Head Start, Reading First, Early Reading First, Even Start, the Parents as Teachers Program, and conduct other activities, such as parent resource centers, that encourage and support parents to more fully participate in the education of their children.

- 5. Shall ensure that information related to school and parent programs, meetings, and other activities is sent to the parents of participating children in a format and, to the extent practicable, in a language the parents can understand.
- 6. May involve parents in the development of training for teachers, administrators, and other staff members to improve the effectiveness of such training.
- 7. May provide necessary literacy training from Title I funds if the school district has exhausted all other reasonably available sources of funding for such training.
- 8. May pay reasonable and necessary expenses associated with local parental involvement activities, including transportation and childcare costs, to enable parents to participate in school-related meetings and training sessions.
