HIGH SCHOOL SPOTLIGHT by Mr. GEIGER!

High School Placement is one of the most important processes our Pride Scholars participate in while attending Pride Academy. Prior to 8th grade, our scholars have the opportunity to apply to various scholarship organizations, such as The Wight Foundation and NJ S.E.E.D.S. These organizations assist middle school students to gain acceptance into boarding, independent day, and community schools. It is vital for parents to begin the high school placement process immediately following the admission of their child into Pride Academy. Beginning in the 5th grade, parents should speak with their children regarding high school options, potential career interests, and goals for their educational future. Our goal is to provide Pride Academy with a stronger and more superior process with each passing year. This year, approximately 91% of Pride Academy's 8th grade scholars achieved acceptance to boarding, parochial, independent, magnet, charter, and technical high schools. Currently, most of our 8th grade scholars have registered at the high schools of their choice and they will soon see how their hard work pays off!

Every year, the High School Admissions process commences with High School Night, which usually takes place during the last week in September. This year's High School Night was on September 28, 2022. Approximately 15 high schools from the surrounding area were in attendance and met with our 8th grade scholars and their families. Following High School Night, Mr. Geiger spoke with our 8th grade scholars and parents/guadians about the high school options available to them. In November, The COOP Exam was administered to some of our 8th grade scholars. This voluntary exam aims to help students gain admission to the parochial schools in our area. Many of our scholars also chose to take the Essex County Vocational School Exam in December, January, and March of 2022 & 2023, in order to help them obtain acceptance at those schools as well.

Mr Geiger assists the 8th grade scholars with researching high schools, application essays, high school applications and mock interviews in his High School Placement classes on Fridays during the 1st and 2nd trimesters. In the third trimester, Mr Geiger prepares our scholars for transitioning into the high school environment by leading various lessons on the skills needed to be successful in high school such as organization and responsibility. Mr Geiger also has invited a number of Pride Academy alumni to speak to the 8th grade to offer advice on how to be successful in high school.

It is very important for our 7th grade scholars to begin preparation for the high school placement process over the summer. Students should actively research high schools in order to discover which schools may offer them the greatest opportunities. Family members should discuss all of the options with their child and guide them in their decision-making. Together, you can choose a high school that best suits the needs and interests of your child.

Mr. Geiger will schedule virtual and in-person meetings with the 8th grade families for the 2023-2024 school year beginning in August. This will allow time to prepare for High School Night, which will take place in September of 2023. We look forward to working with next year's 8th grade scholars, and we wish all of our Pride families a fun and a relaxing summer!

Good luck to our graduating class of 2023! We are so proud of the determination, effort, and resilience you have shown this school year! We will miss you and look forward to your visits back to Pride Academy to share your success and achievements!



PRIDE SPIRIT GAMES & FUN!


At Pride Academy, we want to celebrate our students who have been working hard all year to be real SHINING SCHOLARS! We do this by preparing fun and educational games and activities for the end of the school year. This year the events include the following:

- Field Day Fun and competitive games at Elmwood Park
- Pride Family Cookout On Field Day, we will be providing our scholars with a cookout for lunch.
- Collaborative Wings Mural Project We will have an artist working with all of our scholars to create a wings mural that will permanently be displayed in the vestibule of the Great Room and serve as a backdrop for our weekly award winners and other special events.
- Soul Step Classes Soul Step is a professional dance group that will be teaching our scholars how to Step Dance, which is a traditional dance popular among Black Fraternities and Sororities
- DJ Dance Party scholars and their teachers will gather in the Great Room for a DJ Dance to celebrate the end of the school year.
- Theme Dress Down Days Scholars will have three opportunities to Dress Down Day on Anime Day, Twin Day, and Switch Day (students will dress like teachers and teachers will dress like students).

In order to earn the privilege of participating in these End-of-Year events, scholars must work to make sure that they make their Pride Scholar Chart points. Starting on **Monday**, **May 22nd**, which marks the last 4 weeks before Pride Spirit Days begin, scholars will work to earn at least **285 points a week** and be in uniform **every day**. Scholars who don't meet the expectations will risk not being able to attend all the events and activities that have been planned. * Please note that scholars who make serious poor behavior choices may also lose the opportunity to participate in special events. Additionally, scholars who are failing classes and in danger of retention may not be able to participate in these events so that they can spend the time working on their academic skills. Our goal is to have all 300 Pride Scholars enjoying all the wonderful games and activities together and so we request you to please encourage your children to make good choices for the rest of the school year so that we can FINISH THE YEAR STRONG!

The June 14 workshop topic will be: Summer Reset.





• This is a NJ holiday that school will be closed for. Scholars are not required to attend, but we hope that our Pride families will join us in celebrating Juneteenth together.

• Teachers and Staff are not required to attend and may have other plans with their families and friends. Teachers and Staff who choose to attend may be supervising and enjoying their own children and families that will be joining us. **Therefore, we are not able to provide supervision for any scholars that attend on their own.** For these reasons, **scholars may only attend if they come with a parent or guardian**.

• If a Pride parent accepts the responsibility of supervising a child whose parent is not able to attend, then that parent may also bring that scholar. They must be able to supervise their safety, as well as bring the child and ensure that they go home safely.

• There is a small admission fee of \$10 that will cover the

cost of your lunch, which will consist of BBQ chicken, potato salad, corn bread, beverages, and dessert. The fee will help also us provide all those in attendance with games and entertainment, which will include DJ, an African Dance performance, fun lawn games and prizes for us to celebrate and enjoy our time together as a community.

AFFIRMATIVE ACTIONS PROCEDURES!

Grievance Procedures: Under Title IX, each school district must have a written, publicized grievance procedure for handling complaints alleging sex discrimination. Students, parents, and employees must be fully informed of the steps in the grievance process. It is strongly recommended that discrimination grievance procedures allow for complaints on the basis of race, color, creed, religion, national origin, affectional or sexual orientation, ancestry, socioeconomic status, as well as sex. Title IX does not specify a particular structure for the grievance procedure; it does require that the procedure provide for the "prompt and equitable resolution of student and employee complaints." Therefore, all procedures must include reasonable timelines for the initiation and resolution of a grievance. Any person who believes that he/she has been discriminated against may also file a complaint with the Office for Civil Rights or the Department of Education at the same time a grievance is filed during or after the grievance process, or without using the school district process at all. SPOTLIGHT ON SAFETY!

Spotlight 24: Practicing Peace – Have a Safe, Bully-Free Summer!

As we head into summer vacation, please remind students of the tools and strategies they have learned at Pride Academy to help them avoid and resolve conflict. Encourage students to demonstrate the "Pride Scholar" difference by modeling the core values of peace, respect, integrity, determination and empathy and making positive choices this summer.



Following are a few reminders and practical tips that can help ensure our children return to school happy and healthy in September!

1.Cyberbullying is ALWAYS A NO-NO!

It is never ok to treat others with disrespect, to share inappropriate or embarrassing images, or to bully online. Although students may be in class together over the summer, they can remain in touch through social media. The Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights is in effect every month of the year. It mandates that schools respond to incidents of cyberbullying, if they meet the criteria specified under the legislation, irrespective of when or where it takes place. If a student returns to school in September feeling unsafe, unable to learn, or in conflict with peers because of online bullying, Pride Academy administration will address the issue, in accordance with the law.

2. Avoid Conflicts

- Offer a sincere apology when appropriate or when an apology will end conflict.
- It takes one person to start an argument but it takes two people to keep an argument going. Walk away.
- Treat others with respect. When in doubt, be nice.
- If it feels wrong, it probably is. If whatever you are witnessing makes you feel uneasy, uncomfortable or bad, it's probably because whatever's going on is not okay. Trust your gut instincts.
- It's as simple as that. Do the nice thing whenever possible.

3. Don't put yourself in a dangerous position, but don't ignore bullying.

- Do not be afraid to go get an adult or someone else nearby to help if it feels like you can't handle it on your own.
- If others are arguing or a fight is about to happen, leave immediately. Bystanders can be injured or killed. Violence is not a spectator sport.
- Call 911.

ONLY spend time with people who make positive choices.

Parents: Please monitor your child's online, telephone and text activity closely and be vigilant. Bullying can occur anywhere, including in camps, sports, and summer activities. Only public schools are covered by the Anti- Bullying Bill of Rights. Keep open lines of communication with your children and inform supervising adults of any bullying or safety concerns you or your child may have. Follow these tips and you will be well on your way to having a safe summer. Remember—YOUR CHOICES CHANGE THE GAME. Have a great summer!



We Need Your Help to Reinforce High Expectations for Learning and Behavior at School

- Attendance matters and students should arrive on time for school BEFORE 8:00AM each day. If they plan to eat school breakfast, students should arrive at least by 7:45AM so that they have time to eat their breakfast before the start of their school day at 8:00AM.
- Students should wear a Pride Dress Uniform or Gym Uniform each day to school. Non-Pride uniform sweaters or hoodies may not be worn during the school day. If you need any support with providing your child with a uniform, please reach out to Ms. Dumenigo at ext. 210 or by email at rdumenigo@prideacs.org.
- Students should bring to school: their own face mask and extras in case they need replacements during teh day, their School Agenda, pens, pencils, paper, & headphones for use with their school laptop when required. They must also bring a backpack to school so that they are prepared to carry their school laptop in their backpack from class to class and also to lunch/recess. PLEASE NOTE: Students may not carry their cell phones on their person during the school day or in their backpacks/purses or fanny packs.
- Scholars must have the essential school supplies needed for learning, such as pencils, pens, loose leaf and more. Please be sure to replenish these supplies as the school year continues.
- Students may not bring lunch or snacks that include nuts of any kind, sunflower seeds, candy/chocolate bars, carbonated drinks, and they may not share food items from home or school breakfast/lunch with others.
- If cell phones are brought to school, please know that they may not be used in school at any time (including before school and after school activities and during classes, transitions in hallways, restroom visits, lunch and recess) and must remain locked up in lockers. Cell phones will be confiscated due to lack of compliance with our expectations, and the school is not responsible for lost or stolen cell phones.
- Students must demonstrate the core values of Peace, Respect and Empathy in their words, actions, and interactions with each other and all members of our Pride family. Students may not play fight or hit, touch, slap, kick etc. and must follow the practice of keeping their hands, feet, and belongings to themselves.
- Students should respect and take care of our school property including their school laptop learner, supplies, furniture and restrooms.
- Students must follow these practices with regard to their use of our school restrooms to respect the privacy of others, maintain a high level of cleanliness and sanitary conditions, and protect the destruction of property, fixtures and plumbing:
 - 1. They may only use the stalls by themselves and never be in a stall with other individuals.
 - 2. They may not stand on the commode or look over or under the stall doors/walls into other stalls.
 - 3. They may not place items of food or other objects in the commodes or urinals.
 - 4. They may not urinate or defecate on the floor instead of in the commode or the urinal.
 - 5. They may not vandalize the walls, doors and other areas of the restroom with graffiti.
 - 6. They may not go to the restroom with their cell phones to use their phones and/or video record themselves or others.
 - 7. They may not arrange with others to meet up or congregate in the restrooms at any time during the school day including class time, homeroom time, transitions, and lunch/recess, and after school activities.
